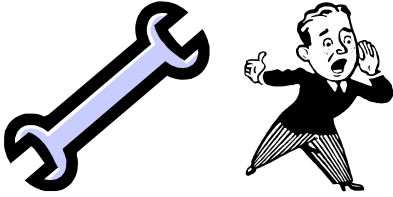

5. Preposition = shows the relationship between a noun or pronoun and another word in the sentence. Ms. F. learned that it's "anything a worm can do to an apple." A preposition begins a prepositional phrase.

The girl in the heavy coat was very hot. (Shows the relationship of the coat to girl.)

The plane flew through the thick clouds.

One of my favorite sports is golf.

Over the river and through the woods to Grandmother's house we go.

6. Conjunction = a word that joins words or groups of words.

She played the guitar and sang.

Have a good time, but don't stay out too late.

The tiny bird could not fly, nor could it feed itself.

7. Interjection = an exclamatory word that expresses strong emotion. It has no grammatical relationship to the rest of the sentence.

Ouch! That hurts!

Wow! The moon is full.

Oh, I made the same mistake again! (Sometimes interjections are followed by commas.)







